The **four portfolios** will include journal responses to assigned readings, in-class writing exercises, “prewriting” activities, rough drafts, peer revision sheets and task papers. Each task paper is worth **125** points. **If you fail to complete all four task papers you will receive a grade of “F” for the course.** We will have a final exam worth **50** points. **You must take the final exam to pass the course.**
