Board of Governor Chair Rick Ebersold asked for a motion to approve the December 2, 2021 Board meeting minutes as presented. Governor Landes made a motion to approve the minutes; Governor Norton seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

Chair Ebersold asked for a motion to ratify the December 7, 2021 Board Poll (MWSU FY21 Audit Report from BKD). Governor Norton made a motion to approve the Board poll; Governor Schoonover seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

Chair Ebersold asked for a motion to ratify the February 1, 2022 Board Poll (Personnel – Marc Archambault). Governor Landes made a motion to approve the Board poll; Governor Norton seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Academic & Student Engagement

- Committee met on February 17, 2022 and the primary focus was discussion in terms of how the University is addressing student mental health.
- It was reported that Dr. Melissa Mace, Vice President of Student Affairs & Enrollment Management shared an overview of the number of students served through the Counseling Center.
- It was reported that Dr. Mace commended Dr. Brett Bruner, Assistant Vice President and Dean of Students for his tireless work and dedication to the University.
- It was reported that Dr. Marc Manganaro, Interim Provost, gave updates to the Committee in terms of Early College Academy, Strategic Faculty Hiring Process, Academic Program Review, and a joint Chairs' meeting.

Policy & Bylaws

- The Committee met on February 17, 2022 and the primary focus was discussion in terms of a Policy on Policies. The Committee produced a draft that was shared with the Board and recommendation for a motion to be brought forth to the Board.
- Discussion among the Board in terms of the Policy on Policies language. After further
 discussion, the Committee agreed to amend the language in the Policy to read,
 "...(except for revisions related to the terms and/or conditions of the Board of Governors
 Bylaws)...."
- Committee Chair Tieman recommended a motion on the Policy on Policies to Chair Ebersold.
- Chair Ebersold asked for a motion to approve the Policy on Policies as presented with amended language. Governor Landes made a motion to approve the policy; Governor Norton seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

Personnel, Finance & Operations Committee

- The Committee met on February 17, 2022 and Vice President of Finance & Administration gave the Committee report.
- VP Morrison updated Board on the Budget to Actual as of January 31, 2022 in all funds for FY2022.

- VP Morrison updated the Board on the University's cash position compared to 2020, 2021, and 2022. The Board was also briefed on actual to actual FY21 compared to FY22 in all funds.
- VP Morrison briefed the Board that the Committee approved a student fee proposal for the Law Enforcement Academy at the Committee meeting.
- The Committee approved a bid proposal (FB22-036) Blum Union roof.
- The Committee approved a bid proposal (FB22-039) Eder Hall roof.
- The Committee approved a contract extension for audit services with BKD, CPA's & Advisors.
- Chair Ebersold asked for a motion to approve the Personnel, Finance, & Operations Committee report as presented. Governor Schoonover made a motion to approve the report; Governor Landes seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

Marc Manganaro, Interim Provost

- Early College Academy
 - Spring enrollment is up 14.33% (1,037 total students)
 - ECA is working toward offering courses and experiences distinctive from other programs in the state, including groups of courses leading to a certificate in areas of high vocational demand (Education, Leadership, Behavioral Health, and Health and Wellness).
 - ECA continues to develop partnerships with area schools to create clear pathways for matriculation to MWSU as a full-time student. Between 18-20% of students with at least one ECA course completed by high school graduation will matriculate as a full-time student to MWSU.
- Master Operational Plan
 - Stakeholders/responsible parties for The Master Operational Plan met int eh fall to launch the Master Academic Plan. The Master Operational Plan is to make sure that aspects of the Master Academic Plan get achieved.
 - Dr. Luanne Haggard, the director of Assessment and Accreditation, will coordinate efforts between units moving forward.
- Strategic Hiring Process
 - The strategic hiring process is moving forward. Currently there are 14 faculty and academic staff searches underway, all approved through this process.
- Academic Program Review
 - The Academic Program Review (APR) Committee began its cyclicial review mostly in Nursing, Health Professions, and Business.
- Joint Chairs Meeting
 - On February 4 the Provost Office conducted a joint chairs meeting, which included all department chairs, deans, and the Provost Office staff.

 Fred Nesslage, director of Engineering and Infrastructure and Kathy Gammon, Budget director led workshops.

New Initiatives

- Two micro-credentials in Psychology and Chemistry are currently under review for recommendation by the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee (UGCC). This is a partnership with area businesses to provide employees training in high demand areas.
- o Dr. Luanne Haggard is working with Jack Panella, Marketing and Communications, to develop a new grants website for faculty.
- o Dr. Mike Ducey, Director of Griffon Office of Applied Learning (GOAL) is working with an intern to develop an interactive, online, applied learning dashboard.

Melissa Mace, Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management

Student Affairs

- Two students were recognized as being part of the 2022 Barbara Sprong Leadership Challenge cohort.
- Under the direction of Susan Garrison, the Center for Academic Support (CAS)
 has earned certification as Level 1, 2, and 3 certified tutor training programs by
 College Reading and Learning Association (CRLA).
- The Campus Cupboard has been selected as one of 17 national recipients to receive a micro grant (\$3,000) that will help expand services to students with food security challenges.
- Kudos to Student Government Association, the Dean of Students Office, and the campus cupboard, for initiating the first Scratch Out Hunger Competition with Northwest Missouri State University.

• Enrollment Management

- o Increase in admitted freshmen for fall 2022 from four local high schools.
- o Increase in admitted freshman for fall 2022 in all Missouri territories.
- o To date, 1,614 students within the state of Missouri have been admitted.

STUDENT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

Student-Governor Hannah Berry briefed the Board that it's hard to believe that we are already a third of the way through the semester and students are gearing up to take midterm exams in the coming weeks. Kudos given to the Student Government Association and Dr. Brett Bruner for all the campus activities and their support of student leaders across campus.

The student-governor application is live and Student-Governor Berry will host a live Zoom meeting on Friday, February 25 to engage with students who are interested in applying to be the next student-governor.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Elizabeth Kennedy, President, opened her report by stating that it's been a pleasure having Student-Governor Berry on the Board and she will be missed.

Dr. Kennedy offered a warm welcome to Marc Archambault, Vice President of Advancement/Executive Director of the MWSU Foundation.

Dr. Kennedy state to the Board that the mask mandate has been lifted and the COVID Response Team continues to meet weekly to monitor the science and data. Appreciation was expressed to Heart to Heart International as MWSU hosted additional vaccine clinics on campus.

Dr. Kennedy updated the Board on the athletic director search and Chris Dunn, Chief of Staff is leading the search. Update was provided in terms of members of the search committee. Mr. Russell Wright from Collegiate Consulting LLC was on campus to meet with stakeholders in terms of search process and timeline.

Dr. Kennedy briefed the Board that the 22nd annual Super Science Saturday was hosted on campus on January 23rd and in partnership with the St. Joseph Museums. Over 500 young children and their families attended. Kudos to faculty, staff, and students for providing this experience.

Dr. Kennedy offered kudos to the Student Government Association in terms of the Scratch Out Hunger competition. Kudos given to the MWSU National Association for Music Education and the Physical Plant for winning trophies for the amount of food and food items collected.

Dr. Kennedy briefed the Board on University initiatives in terms of Gold Fridays. The impact of Gold Fridays has been a priority. A Gold Friday survey was distributed to gather feedback from students, faculty, and staff. 938 students and 293 faculty and staff responded, an overall

response rate of 25%, which is generally considered reasonable for this type of online assessment.

Overall the results provided a strong support for Gold Fridays in each group; 95% of students, 68% of faculty, and 58% of staff indicated that MWSU should maintain Gold Fridays in the schedule. 63% of faculty and staff combined indicated that the Gold Friday initiative was valuable to MWSU.

Dr. Kennedy further updated the Board in terms of Gold Friday survey results, student participation, and student's top reasons for their support of Gold Fridays. 21% of students reported that Gold Fridays provided stress release. This result is beneficial to future Gold Friday programming.

Dr. Kennedy further updated the Board in terms of Gold Friday survey results from faculty and staff and their top reasons for support of Gold Fridays.

Dr. Kennedy updated the Board that she continues to engage in the community at all levels of involvement. Recently, Dr. Kennedy has been invited to serve on the MDHEWD Commissioner Zora Mulligan's Presidents' Advisory Council. Dr. Kennedy continues to be a part of Imagine St. Joseph 2040 Implementation team, Mosaic Life Care Foundation, Community Alliance, and St. Joseph Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Kennedy stated to the Board that on January 27th she traveled to Northwest State University where she participated in a roundtable with Governor Parson in terms of his fiscal year 23 budget recommendations for higher education.

On February 1, Dr. Kennedy traveled to Jefferson City to participate in Great Northwest Days (GNWD). Kudos to Annette Weeks for hosting a successful Great Northwest Days event.

Chair Ebersold asked for a motion to approve MWSU's application for the USDA (RBDG) Rural Business Development Grant, as presented. Governor Tieman made a motion to approve the resolution; Governor Schoonover seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

- Chair Ebersold asked for a motion approve the recommendation from the Personnel, Finance, & Operations Committee to remove the state of financial emergency from the University. Governor Wollenman made a motion to approve the removal of financial emergency; Governor Norton seconded the motion. By voice vote, motion passed 6-0.

Dr. Kennedy expressed appreciation to the Board for the opportunity to meet. Dr. Kennedy stated that the full Board has been kept informed about the progress that the University has made over the past 2 years to move the University forward.

Dr. Kennedy provided 4 points of summary of the evidence and information provided to the Personnel, Finance & Operations Committee.

Over the past 2 years, Missouri Western has put financial policies, procedures, and controls in place designed to make the phrase, "living within our means" a reality.

Missouri Western has developed strong student engagement and enrollment management practices to meet student needs and create an environment where students can have a rich campus experience.

The University has worked to provide high-quality academic programming that is relevant and meets student demand as well as regional workforce needs.

Missouri Western and the education students receive are integral to the success of the community.

Several Board members expressed their support of the removal of the financial emergency.

There being no further business, Chair Ebersold adjourned the meeting.

- New Staff (13), Separations (10) and currently have 34 full-time positions posted to receive applications (11-faculty and 23-staff); as well as 32 student employment positions.
- March 23, 2022 participated in the HRMA City Wide Job Fair at Stoney Creek Inn and Conference Center. Networked and provided information to many prospective applicants. Connections were made to hopefully bring others aware of the multitude of positions we have available on campus.
- Budget preparations are underway for the FY23 personnel budget.
- Employment Dates: Establishing protocols for employment dates (original hire, current hire, first work day and last work day). These dates will be audited for all current full-time faculty and staff. These specific dates are important for regulatory reporting, anniversary dates, and many requests received by the department. Previous protocols were not defined.
- Faculty Promotion and Tenure Dates: Establishing protocols for faculty promotion and tenure dates in. Banner system will track all tenure review dates and effective dates of faculty promotions. This form in Banner was not previously used; however, we have implemented current data as of 11/1/2020 to assist with IPEDS reporting. We plan to now audit all current faculty dates to ensure historical data is present.
- Employee degree data to be stored in Banner System (degree received, graduation date, type of degree). This information is provided each year to the Registrar's office submission in the Academic Catalog. Previously this data has been retained using excel spreadsheets. An audit of staff and faculty degrees will be completed and all appropriate information will be stored in Banner for reporting purposes.
- Other process improvement items yet to be implemented: salary planner, electronic personnel actions, leave reporting, and the adjunct process.
- Employee Benefits: 2022 Annual Performance Review meeting with CBIZ, university's benefits consultant.
- Title IX compliance training was sent to employees during January. Training is conducted using training modules created by Everfi and edited to include our policies and procedures.

Academic Affairs

HIGHLIGHTS

Early College Academy

The Early College Academy (ECA), MWSU's dual credit/dual enrollment program, opened student registration on April 11, and will be fully realizing the Slate student enrollment platform. This is a new automated process for managing student applications as well as communications/student touchpoints to increase matriculation to MWSU as full-time students. The ECA is beginning the self-study process for application to the National Alliance for Concurrent Enrollment Programs (NACEP) accreditation body, which will conclude with a site visit and full review in 2024.

Master Operational Plan (update)

The Master Operational Plan is gathering last quarter data to prepare for an annual progress report to share with the Board of Governors at the August meeting. Units are evaluating Master Academic Plan (MAP) outcomes to make recommendations for adjusting goals and targets. This activity is an ongoing process and is responsive to current needs and demands of Missouri Western. Dr. Luanne Haggard, Director of Assessment and Accreditation, continues to lead these efforts. This data will tie into the regular Higher Learning Commission accreditation reporting cycle.

Strategic Faculty Hiring Process

The Provost Office conducted a second round of evaluations of faculty hiring proposals, resulting mainly from recent retirements, resignations, and current vacancies. These proposals were then sent forth for consideration to VP Morrison and ultimately to President Kennedy. Searches are now underway for positions beginning in August, 2022.

CAEP Accreditation Virtual Site Visit

From April 10th-12th a team from the Council for the Accreditation of Education Preparation (CAEP), the principal accrediting agency for higher education programs in the field of Education, held a cyclical virtual site visit at Missouri Western, which included our Education department's faculty and staff as well as administrators from the across the university. By all accounts the team reported that our program met all standards and indeed passed with flying colors, citing no recommended stipulations.

Academic Program Review (update)

The Academic Program Review (APR) Committee submitted a report for programs identified to be reviewed during an inaugural effort to evaluate programs at Missouri Western. These include: Nursing, Health Care Leadership, Nursing Education, Nursing RN to BSN, MSN/MBA, Accounting, Finance, Management, Marketing, Supply Chain Management, Entrepreneurship minor, Finance minor, General Business minor, and MBA in Forensic Accounting. The appropriate college dean and Provost will review and memorialize these recommendations in accordance with the guidelines developed in the fall of 2021.

Joint Chairs Meeting

The fourth and final Joint Chairs Meeting of the 2021-2022 academic year was held on Friday, April 15th, which included all department chairs, deans, Provost, and Provost Office staff. Beth Potts, Chair of the Academic Program Review (APR) Committee, and Luanne Haggard, Director of Assessment and Accreditation, presented on the APR's first year of review of academic programs, followed by Q&A. A session also was devoted to challenges facing department chairs.

New Initiatives, Events, and Announcements

The Griffon Office of Applied Learning (GOAL) held the first Conference on Applied Learning in Higher Education (CALHE) event since 2018 on April 21 and 22 at Missouri Western. This conference focuses on applied learning in community engagement, research, activities, and theoretical or philosophical foundations. All of which is tied to our university Strategic Plan, the Master Academic Plan and our state designation as the Applied Learning Institution in Missouri. This event will feature many Missouri Western faculty and students, as well as participants and attendees from surrounding communities and institutions across the United States. Dr. Michael Ducey, Director of the Griffon Office of Applied Learning, and the Steering Committee on Applied Learning planned, organized, and implemented the conference in its entirety.

The Undergraduate Curriculum Committee (UGCC) approved new programs and offerings to begin Fall 2022, upon acceptance of MDHEWD. All programs move Missouri Western's mission and vision as the state's Applied Learning institution forward. These include:

- UNV301—Community Service Learning for Majors (a semester-long course for degree-seeking students to provide an opportunity to engage in an approved immersive community service-learning experience within their field of study).
- Laboratory Technician Pre-Apprenticeship Micro Credential (developed to engage high school students in a certification program with options for matriculation to MWSU)
- Applied Behavior Support Services Micro Credential (developed in response to community focus groups identifying skills gaps in the area of behavior health).
- Special Education Micro Credential (developed in response to community focus groups identifying need for trained professionals in the area of special education)
- Digital Media Micro Credential (developed in response to regional market demand (JobsEQ) and employer feedback)
- Bachelors of General Studies (this general education degree was evaluated and adjusted to allow for a broader student choice and flexibility)
- Master of Arts in Teaching (this graduate degree was developed to provide individuals with a bachelors in a related content area to earn education courses toward a teaching credential/license, in response to a great regional market demand and teacher shortage)

Two faculty were awarded the Missouri Western State University Teaching Excellence Award for 2022. They are Dr. Madeline Rislow in School of Fine Arts, and Dr. Adrienne Johnson in Education. Dr. Corey White in Psychology was awarded the prestigious James V. Mehl Award for Research for 2022. We are deeply grateful to these individuals for their tireless efforts in moving the institution forward.

The Division of Student Affairs & Enrollment Management (SAEM) is comprised of eleven (11) major areas: Academic Advising, Academic Support, Admissions, Career Development, Counseling, Dean of Students, Diversity & Inclusion, Global Engagement, Housing & Residential Life, Registrar, and Student Development. To that end, Student Affairs & Enrollment Management focuses on how we serve both prospective and current students to and through a successful collegiate career.

Admissions – Territory Management Team

The Office of Admissions territory management team is wrapping up the spring travel season. This spring included visits to over 197 high schools, 38 community colleges, and 61 college fairs and the Iowa FFA Conference. In addition, admissions counselors were present at Missouri Western's College Writing Day and Student Entrepreneurship Challenge.

Admissions - Communications

While admissions counselors continued texting and emailing prospective students to move them through the recruitment funnel, the more complex communication plan continued. 
Admissions - Campus Visits Program

Since the last Board of Governors report, the Office of Admissions has had over 100 individual visits and seven high school group visits. The Go Griffs Weekly Zoom Series topics included: Nursing, a student panel, eSports, applied learning, and honors. We also experienced 284 visits on our virtual tour. In addition to two Griffon Experience events since the last BOG report (Open House, Learning Laboratory), we supported the Future Filmmakers Festival, eSports Day, and HSES Visit Day.

Admissions - New Student Success

New Student Success (NSS) is working hard to build a GO experience that improves the first impression by reimagining engagement during the event. Some plans include a selfie station, branded decorations, and more. To date, 723 prospective freshmen students have committed to Missouri Western and 537 prospective freshmen students have registered for Griffon Orientation (GO), signaling an increase of 46.7% in Commits at this point in time and 36.6% growth in GO registrations at this point in time.

Fall transfer admission comparison: 2022 compared to 2021



The Admissions office is not functioning without challenges, however. In terms of staffing, the office is currently without on admissions counselor and the office has been functioning with the Vice President of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management also serving as the director of admissions.

Academic Advising – Student Success Center

Director Elaine Bryant and Academic Advisor Cathy Gann retired at the end of March of this year. Nine-year academic advising veteran Derek Evans was named interim director of the Center and began his duties on April 1st. A search is currently underway to fill the open positions.

The Student Success Center provides academic advising to all incoming freshmen with the exception of Nursing and Business students through their first year of academic study. In addition, the Center advises all BGS and BST students. Since the last Board of Governors report, the Center has seen over 398 individual students for a total of 497 visits.

In addition to supporting students through advising appointments, the Center manages the Early Intervention process for those students identified by faculty as falling behind and/or at risk of failure in a course. For the spring semester, 949 Early Interventions have been reported to date.

EdSights is another tool in the Student Success Center toolkit to better understand our student population. Through EdSights, polls are taken throughout the course of the semester to gauge students on a variety of topics. This semester, the following campaigns have been engaged: 1) Spring Temperature Check, 2) Support System Follow-Up, 3) Academic Check-In, 4) Family Support Follow-Up, 5) Housing and Food Security Follow-Up, 6) Persistence Check-In, and 7) Work/School Balance Check-In.

Advising Shout-Out Awards were awarded to Drs. Ollie Bogdon (Education) and Stacia Bensyl (Communication). They both received \$25 ARAMARK Gold Dollars. There was a total of 37 nominations received. The Outstanding Academic Advisor Award recipient was chosen by the Academic Advising Council. The recipient will be announced at the April 21 Faculty and Staff Awards and Retirement Reception.

Academic Advising – Student Success also provides trainings for faculty/advisors. The following highlights faculty advising trainings completed:

- 30 of the 39advisors that are set to expire at the end of the spring 2022 semester have completed their training
- 11 of the 43 advisors that are set to expire at the end of the fall 2022 semester have completed advisor training

Academic Support

As of April 9, 2022, the Center for Academic Support has provided 2,284 total direct tutoring hours during the 2021-2022 academic year.

The Center for Academic Support hosted the Heartland Chapter of the College Reading & Learning Association Conference in April, with Susan Garrison, Director of the Center for Academic Support, being installed as the new president of the chapter.

Registrar's Office

Center for Global Engagement

In February and March, the Career Development Center (CDC) focused primarily on utilizing its online platform, Handshake, to promote student engagement with employers and student career development.

The CDC is providing a three-part workshop series targeted on helping May graduates who may need assistance in securing full-time job opportunities. The series, which begins April 18, will feature workshops on creating effective resumes and cover letters, developing a job search, and leveraging LinkedIn.

Missouri Western State University has been selected to participate in the Missouri Department of Higher Education & Workforce Development's "Student Journey Mapping Workshop" program. Missouri Western State University is one of only 12 institutions selected in the state to participate in this program. Dr. Arnold-Cook will be leading Missouri Western's team is this new approach to support the career development and journey mapping to support non-traditional and adult learner students.

Counseling Center

As mental health issues in college-going students continues to be a concern across the country and at Missouri Western, the Counseling Center offers counseling for free to all Missouri Western students. The Center currently employs a director, Katie Jeffers, a full-time clinician, and four interns. In addition, a full-time crisis clinician from the Family Guidance Center began working in the Center on January 17. The Center is still in need of one additional full-time clinician and plans to launch a search in the new fiscal year.

Because many students who visit the Counseling Center or the Student Success Center often have needs outside the scope of our expertise, including housing and food security issues, Drs. Melissa Mace and Brett Bruner are currently working with the Missouri Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development and the Missouri Division Social Services to provide a DSS social worker who would be on campus one day a week to help students locate and apply for benefits that may mitigate the stress of insecurity related issues.

One of the challenges faced by the Counseling Center was the number of "no-shows" for scheduled appointments with a clinician. To reduce the number of missed appointments, the Center has deployed an opt-in text messaging system through their scheduling technology platform to send text reminders to students regarding their upcoming counseling appointments.

Center Director, Katie Jeffers, has completed training to be able to provide treatment for students with tobacco dependence, expanding the Counseling Center's service to students by providing nicotine replacement products and cessation counseling to students interested in becoming tobacco/nicotine-free.

Finally, the Counseling Center, Dean of Students Office, and Student Government Association (SGA) will be hosting Mental Health First Aid training through Mental Health First Aid Missouri on February 18. A total of 30 students, faculty, and staff members will take part in this day-long certification course.

Dean of Students Office

Missouri Western State University has been as a First-Gen Forward Institution for the 2022-2023 academic year. This designation was extended to 53 higher education institutions for recognition in their demonstrated commitment to advancing first-generation student success. Missouri Western State University is the only higher education institution in the state of Missouri to receive this designation in the 2022-2023 cohort. Dr. Brett Bruner, Assistant Vice President/Dean of Students, will be leading Missouri Western's participation in this program.

The Student Government Association participate in the National Association for Campus Activities (NACA) National Convention in Kansas City in March.

The Student Government Association collaborated with the Center for Service to host Missouri Western's inaugural participation in The Big Event on April 9. The Big Event is a nationwide movement of college students engaged in service to their local communities for One Big Day of One Big Thanks at One Big Event.

The Dean of Students Office, the Counseling Center, and Student Government Association hosted Mental Health First Aid training through Mental Health First Aid Missouri in April. Eight students, faculty, and staff members completed this day-long certification course.

The Dean of Students Office, the Counseling Center, Center for Student Involvement, and Department of Housing & Residence Life teams supported 7 students who participated in the Missouri Partners in Prevention – Meeting of the Minds Conference in April.

The Dean of Students Office and the university Campus Assessment, Response, & Evaluation (CARE) Team continues to respond to referrals associated with students exhibiting concerning behaviors, thoughts, or facing hardships. Since the beginning of the 2021-2022 academic year, the Dean of Students Office and the CARE Team have managed 270 students referred to CARE Team for assistance in the following areas:

The Dean of Students Office continues to manage the Disrupted Attendance Notification Request process, assisting students in navigating campus resources if they are going to be unable to attend class due to bereavement, military service, pregnancy, parenting, illness, injury, accident, natural disaster, or other similar situations. Since the beginning of the 2021-2022 academic year, the Disrupted Attendance Notification process been provided to 351 students experiencing such disruptions.

Center for Diversity & Inclusion

The Center for Diversity & Inclusion launched the Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion (DEI) Training Tuesdays program in February. DEI Training Tuesdays has provided 4 workshops, offered every other week, with 12 students participating in the pilot program.

The Center for Diversity Inclusion partnered with recognized student organizations Black Student Union, NAACP, and the Association of Latin American Students to host 17 events during Black History Month.

The Campus Cupboard continues to provide service to food-insecure students at Missouri Western State University. Since July 2021, a total of 2,559 pounds of food have been distributed to 319 students visiting the Campus Cupboard. 

Housing & Residence Life


The doors in Juda and Beshears Halls have been replaced and are awaiting additional painting.

NCAA Updates

• The Division II Management Council recommended the Presidents Council sponsor three 2023 NCAA Convention proposals, including one that would eliminate the standardized test score from the division's initial-eligibility requirements. This recommendation stems from the NCAA Standardized Test Score Task Force. Management Council also approved extending the COVID-19 alternative initial eligibility standards for students who enroll full-time at a Division II school during the 2023-24 academic year.

- Management Council is also recommending an expansion to the finals format of the Division II Softball Championship from five to six days to improve the student-athlete experience through a less compressed format.
- Management Council also supported several recommendations from the Division II Implementation Committee. Many of these recommendations are non-controversial. Recommendations include adding student representation to the Division II Presidents Council with voting privileges, give voting privileges to the two student-athlete representatives on Management Council, a change in how representation on the NCAA Board of Governors is determined (one member only), and alcoholic beverage sales at Division II championship venues that meet certain requirements. Management Council will continue to discuss other concepts brought forward by the Implementation Committee. Final recommendations will be available from the Implementation Committee this summer.
- Management Council recommended that stunt be added as an emerging sport, adopted a
 recommendation to change the penalty structure for student-athletes who test positive for THC
 during NCAA drug testing, and to pause completion of the Institutional Self-Study Guide for
 active Division II schools, effectively immediately, for the 2021-22 reporting year and
 thereafter.
- Management Council recommended the division continue to hold the Division II Day on February 22nd after the inaugural celebration this year.

MIAA Updates

• The MIAA announced its annual class of Hall of Fame inductees on April 1st. Former Griffon volleyball standout Shelly Lowery was named as one of the 10 student-athletes selected for this honor for the 2022 class. During her time as a Griffon, Shelly was a two-time MIAA volleyball MVP, AVCA 1st Team All-American, NCAA DII Championship All-Tournament Team, two-time AVCA 1st Team All-South-Central Region, South Central Region All-Tournament Team, Academic All-American, and two-time All MIAA 1st Team. Lowery led Missouri Western to its first-ever NCAA DII National Championship appearance in 1995. She was elected to the Missouri Western Athletics Hall of Fame in 2013. The Hall of Fame induction ceremony will take place during the MIAA Awards Ceremony presented by Husch Blackwell on Monday, June 6th in the Music Hall at the Kansas City Convention Center.

Department Updates

- Griffon Athletics will return to the traditional format for this year's 22nd Annual Golden Griffon Awards. The celebratory capstone event will be held on Monday, April 25th at 6:30pm at the Missouri Theater. Throughout the course of this evening, the department will recognize the department's best and brightest from the 2021-22 season. The event will conclude with the announcement of the prestigious Male and Female Student-athlete of the Year award.
- Griffon Athletics will host the 20th annual Missouri Western/YWCA Charity Golf Classic and Auction again this summer. The auction will be held on Yellowfrog on Saturday, June 4th, followed by the golf tournament at St. Joseph Country Club on Monday, June 6th. To secure your team or for more information email Marian Carbin at mcarbin@missouriwestern.edu or visit griff.vn/golf22.

Winter Sports Updates

- Griffon **Women's Basketball** completed a historic season with an NCAA Elite 8 appearance for the first time since 1995. Throughout its run, the team secured an NCAA Central Regional Championship by defeating three higher-ranked teams #2 tournament seed Southwestern Oklahoma State University (111-76), #6 tournament seed University of Nebraska-Kearney (72-59), and #1 tournament seed/#4 nationally ranked team and host Fort Hays State University (70-69).
- Three Griffon **Women's Basketball** student-athletes were named the to the All-Region team Brionna Budgetts, Corbyn Cunningham, and Jaelyn Haggard. Budgetts was also named the Most Valuable Player for the tournament.
- Sophomore women's basketball student-athlete Kadyn Cobb was recognized with the prestigious NCAA Elite 90 Award which recognizes the highest performing academic student-athlete at the final championship site. Kadyn is the first in Griffon history to receive the award.
- A trio of **Women's Basketball** student-athletes were named to the All-MIAA team 2nd Team and All-Defensive Team (Connie Clarke), and Honorable Mention (Brionna Budgetts, Corbyn Cunningham).
- The **Men's Basketball** team completed its season at the MIAA Championships, losing to Rogers State University, 52-49 in the quarterfinal round.
- Two **Men's Basketball** student-athletes were named to the All-MIAA team 3rd Team (Will Eames), and Honorable Mention (JaQuaylon Mays).
- The Men's and Women's Track & Field teams had strong performances at the MIAA Championships in February. Madison Nash finished 3rd in the women's 5000m run with a time of 17:24.61. Seniors and founding members of the track programs Hanna Williams and Jordan Garr won titles in their respective events. Williams clinched the 400m championship with a time of 54.81. By winning the shot put with a throw of 18.48m, Garr became the first two-time MIAA champion in program history.
- The U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) named Hanna Williams and Jordan Garr to the **Central All-Region Team** for their outstanding performances at the MIAA Championships.
- **Jordan Garr and Hanna Williams** qualified for the NCAA Division II National Championships in Pittsburgh, KS. Jordan finished fourth with a throw of 18.31m, earning his first designation as an NCAA All-American. Hanna placed seventh in the 400m with a time of 54.88, becoming the first women's track and field student-athlete in Griffon history to become a two-time NCAA All-American.

Spring Sports Updates

- After securing its first MIAA series of the season against rival Northwest Missouri State University, **Griffon Baseball** secured its second series against Fort Hays State University, blasting five home runs in the series-clinching victory. The win was marked by a 16-5 run-rule victory in the eighth inning and tallied the second-most homers by an MWSU baseball team in a single game in Griffon history.
- The **Griffon Baseball** team has wone 6 of its last 10 games.
- With senior **Alex Crouch's** go-ahead, three-run home run against Quincy University on Tuesday, April 19th, Crouch broke the single-season home run record and gave MWSU baseball the 5-2 win. Crouch's 15th home run of the season breaks a four-way tie with Troy Landi (2009), Grant Fink (2013), and Jeremy Alvarado (2016). He is four home runs away from tying David Glaude for the most career home runs in program history (30).
- **Griffon Softball** is currently sitting in 8th place in the MIAA at the midpoint of the regular season. One of the key wins of the season to date was a 3-2 victory over #19 University of Central Oklahoma.
- On March 21st, sophomore Sydney Rader was named **MIAA Pitcher of the Week**. The Griffons went 5-1 during the week. In 22 innings pitched at the Fairfield Inn & Suites Classic, Rader allowed just three runs while totaling 35 strikeouts.
- Head Softball Coach Joe Yegge secured his **700**th **career victory** as a head coach in a 2-1 Griffon victory over Emporia State University on April 2nd.
- **Griffon Tennis** is currently 13-4 overall for the season and tied for second in the MIAA at 4-2. The Griffons are ranked #57 in the latest poll.
- Continuing its best season in 26 years, the **Griffon Tennis** team entered the Central Regional rankings at #4, putting them ahead of MIAA rivals Northwest Missouri State and Nebraska-Kearney. The Griffons have twice won an impressive six matches in a row on the season.
- For the first time in 37 years, **Griffon Tennis** defeated Northwest Missouri State University. The Griffons won the match 6-1, capturing the doubles point and four of the six singles matches.
- Sophomore **Alycia Gann** has earned MIAA Golfer of the Week, and been medalist (1st place, 2nd place) for two tournaments so far this season. The women's golf team also finished second at the Holiday Inn Express Classic.
- Men's Golf finished sixth at the MIAA Championship, closing the 2021-22 season. Freshman Jeffery Johnston earned 1st team All-MIAA honors with his performance at Winter Stone Golf Course. Johnston is the first MWSU freshman since former Student-athlete of the Year Patrick McCarthy in 2016. Seniors Tom Buffington (T13) and Matt Thoms (T30) finished their Griffon career at this event.
- **Griffon Lacrosse** freshman midfield Mikaela Ness was named the first-ever Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC) Offensive Player of the Week in program history. Ness scored five goals in Missouri Western's 11-10 victory over Davis & Elkins.
- Men's and Women's Outdoor Track & Field broke five program records at the K.T. Woodman Classic Riley Gorham (1,500m and 800m), Bailey Gilbert (triple jump), and Jordan Garr (shot put and hammer). Garr also won the shot put with a throw of 17.58m, while Madison Nash came in second place in the 10,000m race with a time of 36:07.43. Hanna Williams (400m) and Jordan Garr (shot put and hammer) scored NCAA provisional marks in their respective events.

- The **Women's Outdoor Track and Field** took fifth place, while two program records fell at the Mule Relays. The **Men's Outdoor Track and Field** took eighth place. The Griffons had a handful of top five finishes Jordan Garr (1st shot put), Women's 4x100 Relay (1st), Hanna Williams (2nd 200m), Madison Roumph (2nd long jump), MJ Smith (3rd 200m), Dallas Thompson (3rd shot put), Bailey Gilbert (3rd triple jump), Madison Roumph (4th triple jump), Men's 4x100 Relay (5th), and Halley Wilmes (5th 400m).
- **Griffon Football** hosted its annual spring game, and the offense shined with a 37-11 victory in a controlled scrimmage. The Griffons will open the fall 2022 season against the University of Central Oklahoma on Thursday, September 1st at 7pm.

Personnel Updates

• Dr. Eric Kramer, Associate Director of Athletics – Compliance and Sport Administration, has accepted a position to become a member of the Sports Administration faculty at Northern Illinois University, and will be teaching in the graduate program. Eric completed his doctorate degree in December 2021. Kramer has been a Griffon since 2007, serving 12 years in the Department of Athletics and three years as an academic advisor in the Western Institute. Kramer will remain with the department through June 30th.

Recreation Services

- The Baker Family Fitness Center has seen over 700 individual users visit the facility this academic year.
- The Thomas Eagleton Indoor Pool has had over 2,300 visits to the facility by the campus community and St. Joseph community.
- Spring 2022 Intramurals were dampened a little this season by unexpected weather interruptions. Semester statistics include:
 - o 74 previously participating students (89.19% M/10.81% W)
 - o 55 newly registered students (85.45% M/14.45% W)
 - ∘5v5 Men's Basketball was the highest participation.

- Recreation facilities will begin alternative hours for the summer on May 7th (except for the pool which goes until Memorial Day).
- Recreation Services and Esports traveled to Illinois State University to collaborate with their departments on successful programming development, varsity recruitment and management, and facility development.
- Recreation Services co-sponsored the Mario Kart Grand Prix during MWSU Esports Week.

Griffon Esports

- In March Griffon Esports created and competed in a tournament that included most of the schools in the MIAA. Both League of Legends and Rocket League went undefeated in their respective tournaments.
- Griffon Esports has a total of 466 students signed up with an account in the arena.
- Check-ins were as follows: 655 check-ins in February with 23 days of operation, 531 check-ins in March with 20 days of operations.

- Five events were held in the month of March and saw a total of 318 students participate in those events.
- Programs and Student Organizations have started to use the arena regularly for events.

Report to the Board of Governors

April 28, 2022

Introduction

As of this writing, only final exam week remains of the spring semester. The past fifteen weeks have seen a much-welcomed return to normalcy on our campus. MWSU has been humming with many activities, events, and celebrations held among our students, faculty, and staff, and we have also enjoyed hosting many external groups, including a variety of community, business/industry, and secondary education partners and associates. As the weather warms and the spring flowers bloom, it has been wonderful to witness the vibrancy fully return to MW's campus.

I am pleased to provide the following updates and highlights. Additional details may be found in the Vice Presidents' and/or unit reports provided herein this Board Book.

COVID-19 Update

As of February 18, MW rescinded the face covering requirement for indoor public spaces. Since that time, the number of COVID-19 cases reported have been steadily declining; currently, we have not had a single COVID-19 case reported, on or off campus, since March 28, 2022. Given that: a) the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services has been reporting a "low" COVID-19 level for our county and region for several weeks; b) the Saint Joseph Health Department has stopped reporting case and positivity rates due to such low numbers; c) Mosaic Life Care Health System has not had the requisite COVID-19 cases related to hospitalizations or positivity; and d) the bi-weekly Community COVID-19 Conference call have been put on hold, our campus COVID-19 Response Team has moved to a stand-by position. We have removed our webpage COVID-19 dashboard and other related content which is no longer pertinent to current conditions. While we are all very encouraged by the current state of affairs, please know that Dean Harris, our Campus COVID-19 Coordinator, will continue to monitor conditions to keep us abreast of any changes.

Additionally, MW completed its most recent partnership with the non-profit organization Heart to Heart International when we hosted a community vaccination event on March 31. Twenty-eight individuals attended, with a majority receiving their second vaccine dose. We are grateful for the opportunity to assist in this type of public health effort.

Summer Enrollment

The first Summer 2022 session begins May 31. Enrollment figures comparing current numbers to those of the same time last year are strong. However, given that we are seven weeks out from the session start, the growth in enrollment at this time may be more of an indication that our efforts to encourage students to sign-up for classes early are paying dividends. Academic Affairs is monitoring courses and working with deans and department chairs to manage enrollments for maximum efficiency. I will continue to provide summer enrollment information as we get closer to the session's start date.

Fall 2022 Enrollment

Retention efforts for our continuing students are underway through Academic Affairs, Admissions, and Advising. We are calling, texting, and emailing students as well as using posters, yard signs and our campus tv monitors to ensure they enroll for next fall prior to their departure at the end of this semester. Overall retention of current students is approximately 70%, nearly 8% higher than at the same time last year. As Governors will recall, our Fall 21 – Spring 22 retention was nearly 88%, and we are confident that our Spring 22 – Fall 22 retention will be at least at the same if not higher percentage rate.

New student recruitment continues to show positive signs. We continue to maintain a gain of approximately 600 admitted students as compared to last year, with 259 more students indicating they are coming to MW in Fall 2022. Further, as of April 12, we had 526 registered for one of our summer Griffon Orientation (GO) sessions. Majors of strong interest for these new students include nursing, elementary education, computer science, criminal justice, respiratory therapy, and business – accounting/management. Additionally, we are beginning to see gains in enrollment for both two- and four-year transfer students. While it is early in the enrollment cycle for these students, we are optimistic about the trends emerging, particularly as the initial negative impact of our program eliminations do not seem to have a lasting effect.

University Initiatives

Strategic Plan: Pathways to Excellence

MWSU's strategic plan, Pathways to Excellence has a sunset date of 2022 and, therefore, we are beginning initial assessment of impact and value to the University. To that end, I have asked Dr. Joel Hyer, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, to lead this work. Dean Hyer will be collecting data regarding attainment of the plan's objectives (e.g., has an objective been achieved? Is a given objective one that the University wishes to continue to pursue? Is there an objective the University should add to a particular pillar of the plan? etc.) as well as feedback about the efficacy of the plan from our campus community. Rather than conducting a complete plan revision, Dr. Hyer's work will provide slight adjustments which will allow for greater alignment with the 2021 Master Academic Plan (MAP). More details will be shared as they become available.

Center for Service

The Center for Service partnered with MWSU's Student Government Association (SGA) to hold MWSU's first ever The Big Event day. Introduced in 1982 at Texas A&M, The Big Event has become the largest one-day student-run service project in the nation. SGA and the Center worked with Beautify St. Joseph's grassroots effort to help clean up the city. The Center recruited over 100 student, faculty, and staff volunteers who worked for two hours alongside community volunteers to clean up a neighborhood in the north end of St. Joseph. MWSU volunteers wore "The Big Event" t-shirts provided by SGA. There was a great deal of positive press associated with our MWSU students whose efforts were very much appreciated.

Center for Military and Veterans Services

The Center for Military and Veterans Services held MWSU's first ever Bataan Memorial Walk, a three-mile trek across the campus to raise awareness for the Center and for veterans. Additionally, Alpha Sigma Pi, a MWSU fraternity, raised \$500 which they donated to Homes For Troops, a non-profit agency which builds and donates custom homes for post-911 veterans. The walk was conducted in commemoration of the 76,000 American and Filipino troops made to walk more than 60 miles, many to their death, in the spring of 1942 as World War II ramped up in the Pacific Region.

State Legislative Update

The Missouri House of Representatives recently approved the governor's recommendation of a 5.4% increase for public four-year institutions in House Bill 3003. The House also appropriated our request for the Convergent Technology Alliance Center (CTAC) in House Bill 3020. Those two bills await a hearing in the Senate Appropriations Committee, which will take place later in April.

Community Engagement and Relations

As is typical in my reports, my efforts to infuse MWSU into our community; to engage, reengage, repair, build, seek out opportunities to connect with a host of individuals – our community and regional, business and industry leaders as well as our elected officials – so as to promote the University in every way possible are ongoing.

I had the honor of meeting with Lt. Governor Mike Kehoe on Friday, April 1 while he was visiting our region. In attendance also were Natalie Redmond, President, Saint Joseph Chamber of Commerce, John Josendale, candidate/now mayor-elect of Saint Joseph, and Senator Dan Hegeman. The opportunity to discuss MWSU among these northwest Missouri leaders with Lt. Governor Kehoe was invaluable.

On Monday, April 11th, I participated in a Community Alliance Podcast (video and audio), during which I highlighted all the good initiatives, events, and occurrences we have in motion at MWSU. I did a similar presentation for the Imagine Saint Joseph 2040 Implementation Team meeting on April 18th and will do one for the Community Alliance Board on May 24th.

I have been asked by Mosaic Life Care Health Systems to provide a workshop on the "Joyful Leader" for the annual employee lunch – learn series on April 29th. I have been in conversation with several folks at Mosaic related to their efforts to support their frontline caregivers during the pandemic. Given my background in thanatology, I have offered my services to help with efforts to support their employees in this important and impactful work.

Finally, I will be participating in the Saint Joseph Legislative Partnership "DC Fly-In" May 17-18. Our group has appointments scheduled with Senators Graves and Hawley to discuss issues most pressing to Saint Joseph and the entire NW Missouri region.

Financial Situation

Removal of the state of financial emergency has been received well by our campus and the community at-large. I am grateful to the Governors for their strong advocacy and solid oversight

of the University as we all – administrators, staff, faculty, and students - worked so diligently to achieve this goal.

Despite this success, efforts to ensure the long-term viability of the University are a top priority. Through the adoption as well as an ongoing refinement of appropriate controls, guidance, and oversight, MW will truly continue to "live within our means." Essential to this is the finance/budget education, which is being provided to our campus stakeholders, coupled with initiatives orchestrated through Student Affairs and Enrollment Management and through Academic Affairs.

Summary

While there are still challenges facing us, I am confident that we are moving forward with clear direction and sure purpose. I am as grateful for the unwavering dedication of our faculty and staff to the success of our students. Additionally, the support that the University routinely receives from our community is strong and growing. I am confident that MWSU has a bright future, and I am thrilled to a member of the Griffon Family.
