Four students and Honors Director Dr. Teddi Deka attended the Great Plains Honors Council Conference April 10-12 in South Padre Island, Texas. Students first submitted their posters or presentations for review by the Great Plains committee. Senior, Megan Wood (Education), juniors, Ida Haefner (Biology) and Kelly Cochran (Biology) and sophomore, Maggie Lee (Exercise Science), were selected to present. This is Megan's third time going to the Great Plains Honors Conference. She said, "The location really helped play up my presentation about cross-culture education and communication. It made it fun and the beach was just an added bonus." Kelly Cochran received a first-place award for her poster entitled "Scientific Communication: Designing an Ammeline Riboswitch Across Oceans." Kelly's research incorporated her field of study with the theme of the conference, "Transcending Borders." She replicated an experiment which involved collaboration with a scientist at the University of Manchester.

English professor, Dr. Stacia Bensyl, has been a professor at Missouri Western for 24 years. Dr. Bensyl originally attended college in pursuit of an anthropology degree. She decided this was not the path for her and took time off from school. She held several secretarial jobs and worked at a bank. She decided to go back to college to become a high school teacher, majoring in Spanish and minoring in English. During an English literature class, at what is now Northwest Missouri State University, Dr. Bensyl had to research a poem, which contributed to her passion for English. She commented, "There was so much to talk about in a relatively brief piece of writing." She graduated from Northwest with a B.S. in Education, and was awarded a Rotary International Scholarship her senior year. This scholarship allowed Dr. Bensyl to pursue her Master's degree at the University College Dublin in Ireland. She later came back to the states and enrolled in the Ph.D. program at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She received her Ph.D. in 1998. When asked what her favorite hobby is, Dr. Bensyl answered, "I love to teach." When she is not teaching at Missouri Western, Dr. Bensyl is traveling the world. She has been to 10 different countries, and this summer she will continue traveling. "This summer I will be in Hawai'i co-directing a three week institute on Japanese Studies for undergraduate professors, and



then later in the summer I am co-directing a workshop in Hiroshima and Nagasaki for undergraduate professors." Her other hobbies include learning languages and knitting.

Jenny is a psychology major who plans to attend graduate school at Missouri Western for human factors and usability. Her honors thesis is titled "Reactions to internet security warning pop-ups on personal computers as opposed to institutional computers." Jenny discovered that people hesitate longer to click through a security warning when on a personal computer. Jenny's project was sponsored by psychology professor, Dr. Jo Elliott. Elizabeth is a history major with a minor in legal studies; she plans to attend law school in the fall at Arizona State University. Her honors thesis was entitled, "Henry Clay's motives for compromise: self-



serving or nationalistic?" Elizabeth discovered that Clay viewed slavery as a necessary but evil economic institution that he disagreed with overall. Elizabeth was sponsored by history professor Dr. Steve Greiert.
