Students traveled to the Ozark Underground Lab September 13-15 as part of their HON395 course entitled "Extinction is Forever-Topics in Conservation Biology." Accompanied by instructor Dr. Mark Mills, Honors Committee members Dr. William Russell and Dr. Teddi Deka, and Honors Program student assistant Raechel Tittor, students spent the weekend searching for scorpions, touring the Karst lands above the cave system, and searched for endangered species only found in Tumbling Creek Cave.

The Honors Program recently welcomed two new members to the Honors Committee: Drs. Jones Mutua and Gaywyn Moore. Dr. Jones Mutua (right) joined MWSU's Computer Science, Mathematics, & Physics department in August 2018 after completing his interdisciplinary Ph.D. in Mathematics and Physics from UMKC in July 2018. At MWSU, he has taught a variety of courses including the Calculus I (MAT167) honors course. His



research interests include applied mathematics, with specific areas of interest in mathematical biology (viral dynamics and immune systems, and epidemiology), and mathematical modeling. Currently, his primary focus lies on developing within-hosts and between-hosts models of infectious diseases. Dr. Gaywyn Moore (left) is an Assistant Professor of English and Modern Languages, and specializes in Early Modern British Literature, especially Shake-speare. She also specializes in early modern travel by women, drama, and utopian/dystopian literature. She doesn't have a favorite Shakespeare play because that's impossible, but she's particularly fond of plucky, cross-dressing heroines. GET TO KNOW AN HONORS PROFESSOR: DR. BILL RUSSELL



Q. What is your educational background, and what do you teach here at MWSU?


A. I am a Professor in the Dept. of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. I got my Ph.D. at The Univ. of Missouri (in Health and Exercise Science) and have been at MWSU since 2005. In the HPER program, I teach the Honors section of PED 101 and also Psychology of Sport, Psychology of Exercise, Sociology of Sport, Research Methods, and Measurement and Evaluation.

Q. How have you been involved with the Honors Program?

A. I taught HON 395 several times (2010, 2014, 2016) called "The Mental Side of Greatness." I served on the Honors Committee since I arrived at MWSU and served on all of the subcommittees for the Honors Program. Currently I serve on the Honors Fall Retreat subcommittee and helped plan and attend the recent Fall 2019 Retreat to the Ozark Underground Lab (OUL).

Q. What is your family like?

A. I have a wife who teaches French at the high school level and my son graduated from the US Air Force Academy and is now in graduate school.
