



Accreditation

Accreditation supports our ongoing focus on institutional improvement, ensures that we remain accountable to our constituencies, and provides us with a broad framework for action as we work to achieve our mission.

Missouri Western is accredited by the <u>Higher Learning Commission</u> (HLC), one of the six regional accrediting associations in the United States. HLC accredits institutions of higher education in 19 states and has approximately 1,000 member institutions.

Missouri Western's accreditation was reaffirmed on January 24, 2017 and participates in the <u>Open Pathway</u>. We value the insights provided through the accreditation process and seek to use this information to strengthen our institution.

Missouri Western is a member of the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (NC-SARA), which provides a voluntary, regional approach to state oversight of postsecondary distance education. When states join SARA, they agree to follow uniform processes for approving their eligible institutions' participation. They also agree to deal with other states' SARA institutions in a common way when those institutions carry out activities in SARA states other than their own. Foundation

The Missouri Western State University Foundation was established in 1969 as an independent entity to promote private giving to help the University move into the forefront of public higher education. The Foundation encourages, holds, invests and disburses private gifts of cash, securities, appreciated assets and personal property, all toward the goal of providing services, programs and facilities that strengthen the mission of the University. Donations and gifts may be unrestricted or restricted to target specific interests of the University including scholarships, awards, equipment grants, program funding and capital improvements or may be unrestricted to assist with the future needs that meet the goals of the institution.

Capital campaigns allow the Foundation to secure private sector resources to perpetuate the distinctive values and contributions of Missouri Western State University. Major gifts to the Foundation have contributed substantially toward the growth of the University and its continuous goal of excellence in such projects as the Fulkerson Center, Spratt Memorial Stadium video scoreboard, Bill Snyder Pavilion, Victory Plaza, Looney Arena, Leah Spratt Hall, the Glenn E. Marion Memorial Clock Tower, the University Plaza, Kelley Commons, the Walter Cronkite Memorial, and the Agenstein/Remington Halls project, improvements to Potter Hall and the Hearnes Center, and the establishment of the Craig School of Business & Technology.

The Missouri Western Foundation is a tax-exempt corporation; therefore, gifts made through it are tax deductible as appropriate. Its activities are directed by an independent, volunteer board that works closely with the University administration to identify needs and allocate funds.

The Missouri Western Alumni and Friends Association

The Missouri Western Alumni and Friends Association was established in 1970 to be the central link between MWSU and its alumni. The Association promotes and fosters a lasting and mutually beneficial relationship between alumni, MWSU, its students and the community to support the goals, traditions and mission of MWSU. In support of this mission, the Alumni Association Advisory Board works to promote recruitment, retention, advocacy, and financial support while also encouraging alumni and friends to use their time, talents and energy for the advancement of MWSU.

During Homecoming week, the Association recognizes outstanding alumni, a current faculty member, graduating students and a University supporter at its annual banquet. Nominations for the awards may be submitted year-round on the University website. The Association serves more than 29,000 Missouri Western alumni who reside in all 50 states, as well as several foreign countries and territories. 
Fall Application Funnel




Enrollment Demographics: Sex and Ethnicity

Of the 4,534 degree-seeking students enrolled during the 2019-20 academic year, approximately 61% were female. Of all students, approximately 26% were students of color, with slightly higher representation of students of color (approximately 29%) among males than females.

Enrollment Demographics: Non-Degree Seeking Students




Enrollment among female non-degree seeking students has increased over the past 4 years, driven largely by the Early College Academy. Of the 327 non-degree seeking students enrolled in "regular" terms during 2019-20, approximately 63% were female, echoing our degree-seeking enrollment.

First to Second Year Retention Rates


One Year Retention Rates of First-Time, Full-Time Students

Graduation Rates


Cohort Graduates Over Time: Bachelor's Degree

Degrees Awarded by Level and Sex


Degrees Awarded: Sex



In academic year 2019-20, we awarded 821 degrees and certificates. Baccalaureate degrees made up 84% (692), master's degrees made up 11% (86), associates degrees made up 3% (27), 1% (10) were certificates and 1% (6) were graduate certificates. Of the degrees awarded, 534 were to female students and 287 were to male students.

Degrees Awarded: Ethnicity





Degrees Awarded: Craig School of Business and Technology




School of Fine Arts (now part of the college of Liberal Arts)

Degrees Awarded: School of Fine Arts





Degrees Awarded: Graduate School









Sex and Ethnicity of Instructional Staff: Fall 2019












FY 2018-2019 Revenue Breakdown







Fiscal Year 2020 Student Employment


